EMJOS November 2024 to January 2025

Training, events and JROS Camps

Hawkshead JROS 24th Nov 2024

Ellie participated at the JROS weekend training in the Lakes for 15/16 year olds. Andy Simpson (coach) and Ellie joined the Northern Ireland squad for the rotation around the 3/4 technical areas (Colonel's Drive, Tarn Howes). However, the snowy conditions over night Friday meant

that the first Saturday morning session was cancelled, and instead indoor training exercises and navigational games were quickly assembled by the coaches.

Cake Stall at Shirebrook NOC event 17th Nov 2024

Amazing variety of beautiful cakes brought by the juniors and very generous donations given by hungry orienteers - £213 (equivalent to covering most of the minibus hire for a weekend trip).

Outwoods 15th December 2024

In partnership with the LEI EML event (access and control sites), EMJOS and West Midlands squads used the area to practice the planning and visualisation techniques to navigate through the rougher EM terrain. Planned by Andy Simpson practice for his coaching qualification. The controls for the event were also used for the training loops. 8 juniors from the East Midlands and about 15 from WMJS joined after the session for hot chocolate and cake to celebrate the festive year end.

Sherwood Forest 18th January 2025

The access to the wood was coordinated by Hilary Palmer (NOC) for a MapActive session, which was extended to a limited number of juniors from East and West Midlands squads having a full day session in the same enclosures using the same kites (controls kindly set out by Hilary the day before).

The morning session was focused on bearings and distance, planned by Andy Simpson for his coaching qualification. The area was clear of undergrowth so was perfect to practice the setting of accurate bearings again (New Forest 2024 weekend trip combined squads) or for the first time. The afternoon session was led by Alistair Powell - again developing the techniques practice over the last 3 squad sessions.

1st Feb Beacon Hill - final coaching qualification session for Andy Simpson. 16th Feb Cake Stall at East Midland Championships Martinshaw and Ratby Woods. 8th March 2025 Stanton Moor - combined squads training (EMJOS, WMJS and YHJS)

EMJOS are now actively taking juniors from the region's clubs who are at Orange level or better, in an attempt to coach them and give them the junior focused experience of training. We had 2 juniors join EMJOS at Outwoods (LEI juniors) and 2 new NOC juniors at the Sherwood Forest session who had come through from the Map Active sessions. All four were visibly engaged with the session and enjoying the challenges and company.

JWOC by Ben Squire

In the summer of 2023 I travelled to Romania for my first Junior World Champs. With little expectations after an injury-disrupted build up, I ran alright. A good (great, in hindsight) run in the sprint, some poor individual forest races and a couple of decent relay runs. These were results that I was content with but having watched Jim Bailey come agonisingly close to a Top 6 in the Sprint and seeing the Men's and Women's Relay teams just run out of it again for a podium spot, all I could think about coming back from Romania was that I wanted to be pushing for those Podium spots too. After finishing the champs I was already looking through the 2024 details, planning, and dreaming how I could get there.

Training went pretty well. I geared my whole year around being in the best possible shape for JWOC and I executed that. Doubts after a nervy set of selection races were eased on a 10 day training camp in Czechia and I felt confident flying out to the races. I had put a lot of time and effort into these races, orienteered more than I ever had, trained more than I ever had, and was crucially the best orienteer I've been. All I had to do was put it together on the day. The only thing that I'd been struggling to do in the build up: one poor route choice in the selection races, one misread barrier in the test races and one stupid mis-punch at the British Champs the week beforehand. Despite this I was confident that the training I'd done was correct and that it would 'click' when it needed to.



The first race was the sprint relay around a residential area in Pilsen. Being in the second team I did my job, bringing the team up 9 places whilst also keeping my powder dry for my main focus the next day, the Sprint. This was the race where I held the most hope of a good result. I have always been more confident in the sprint and had worked hard to know what to expect, drawing my own map and spending hours on street view on the streets of Stribro. The warm up went well, I was feeling good on the start line, ready for it to finally 'click'. And it didn't. I was thrown by a big route choice to the first control and lost 30s taking the wrong one. By the 4th control I was 45s down and I finished 90s behind the leader in 45th, having lost another 20s on the second big route choice. I was frustrated and annoyed at myself, especially with the fact that, after all that work, I had done worse than the previous year when I came 38th.

No rest for the wicked though as the next day we were straight into 90 minutes of lovely Czechia

forest for the long. Having had a mare in a Romanian forest 365 days earlier and still frustrated from the previous day, I was determined to have a solid run and be sensible out there. This time around I did just that. It was by no means an incredible run, mistakes crept in in places and the physicality of the forest made it tough going on the third consecutive day of racing but on finishing I was much prouder of that run than the previous day. Strong runs from Euan Tryner coming 13th and Immy Pieters in 14th meant that I was much more positive going into the rest day than I was 24 hours earlier.

The final individual race was the Middle in some of the nicest forest I've ever ran on. Super clean forest and clear contour features meant for some fast and furious racing where any mistakes would be punished. I had the cleanest run of my life, hitting controls smoothly and was pushing to the maximum the whole way round. Coming into the arena I was confident and thought I was on for a really strong result, maybe even a top 20. I finished 60th, my worst result of the week; turns out that I wasn't the only one orienteering well out there, bloody JWOC. Despite the result, this was the run I was happiest with all week. I orienteered well and pushed as much as I could, as much as I'd like to be able to, I can't stop everyone else from doing the same thing! This gave me confidence for the relay on the same area and going out on the first leg for the first team I had one job, don't mess it up. And mostly I didn't. A couple



lapses in confidence meant it wasn't quite the perfect run that I'd been dreaming of over the last year but it was a strong improvement on the previous year and I set James Hammond up in a good enough place to then have a blinder to bring us up to podium contention. Sadly we were run out of it towards the end of the

third leg but to be a part of such a strong team and have a respectable run was a happy way to round off the week.

Was this the week that I was dreaming about in a Romanian hotel in 2023? No. But am I still content with it? Mostly. The painful thing about orienteering is that no matter how much you prepare and how much you 'want' a race to go well, sometimes it just doesn't. I'm happy that I gave it a good shot, and left no questions or what-ifs. We all orienteer because we love it, and despite not getting what I wanted, I loved trying to accomplish my dream. A big thank you to EMOA and the Athlete Support fund for helping me give it a go.

Clumber Park - History

Clumber Park is to be used for the CompassSport Cup tie hosted by NOC. Many of us will attend, so I thought I would provide some of the background to the area (based on National Trust information). The story of Clumber Park begins in 1709 when John Holles, the 3rd Duke of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, was granted a licence to enclose 3,000 acres of Sherwood Forest and turn it into a deer park for Queen Anne. When he died, his nephew, Thomas Pelham-Holles, the 4th Duke, took on the estate. He died childless but had thankfully made himself the 1st Duke of Newcastle-under-Lyne, a new title which could be handed down to his sister's son. This meant Henry Fiennes Pelham-Clinton became the 2nd Duke of Newcastle-under-Lyne in 1768, promptly inheriting Clumber Park.

The 2nd Duke was the first to make Clumber Park a home, turning it into an estate dedicated to pleasure on a grand, almost unimaginable scale. He had a mansion built in the early 1760s, designed by Stephen Wright, which was regarded as one of the finest non-Royal houses in the country. A classical building of white freestone (brought from the Duke's own quarry), flanked by a square wing at each corner, with the central portion, which faced the lake, containing a light Ionic colonnade.

The core of the house was the original ducal hunting lodge which had previously existed on the



site. This meant that rooms in the centre of the house were not particularly grand, however, those in the new flanking wings more than compensated. The State dining room was 60ft long and 34ft wide and designed to accommodate 150 guests seated at

one table. The 4th Duke was a renowned collector and filled Clumber House with many paintings by Gainsborough, Van Dyke, Poussin and Rembrandt to name a few. There were also various treasures, including busts, statues, china and an extensive collection of rare books including a Book of Hours, a first folio Shakespeare, and three Caxtons.

The gardens and parkland of the estate were particularly impressive, both in scale and the care and money that had been lavished upon them. Writing in 1896, Cornelius Brown stated that "The lawns and terraces are laid out with much skill, and tastefully adorned with lofty vases and graceful statuary" and Leonard Jacks, in 1881, described the lawns as "...very fine, smooth, velvety".

The double avenue of lime trees, created for the 5th Duke, was planted with 1,296 trees and stood at three miles long. Today, it still is the longest in Europe.

The lake, added by the 2nd Duke, took 15 years to create by damming the River Poulter and excavating the river bed. It was further enlarged and extended in 1817 and 1885 until it covered 87 acres and was almost two miles long.

The fire on 28 March 1879 was devastating. Not only for the extensive damage to the house, gutting 20 of the 105 rooms, but also the loss of many fine artworks, although many were rescued. The fire destroyed the central core of the house, leaving the wings standing round a hollow shell.

The trustees of the 7th Duke, who was just 15 years old and had inherited Clumber only a few months before, were faced with the quandary as to whether to rebuild. The 6th Duke had been an extravagant spender who had significantly reduced the family fortune. However, as Leonard Jacks stated, the Dukes of Newcastle's rent roll was vast and although they could not replace the artworks, they could rebuild the house.

Charles Barry, whose father was the famous Sir Charles responsible for the Palace of Westminster, was put in charge of the work. He replaced the lost rooms in the centre of the house with an enormous entrance hall, which featured balustraded galleries, tessellated pavements and various niches for the surviving statuary.

Another fire in April 1912 ravaged the upper two floors, and whilst not as serious as the previous fire, added to the burden. When the decision to demolish the house, taken by the 9th Duke who had inherited it, was announced in the local paper, it stated that "the decision to completely demolish the mansion has been taken with great reluctance by the present owner, but it has been necessitated by heavy taxation". Though it played a part, a more significant factor was that Clumber House had been built for a different age; an age of huge, lavish house parties and vast wealth. With the passing of the former and major pressures on the latter, houses on this scale were just no longer sustainable.

The demolition of Clumber House was contracted out to Henry Boot Construction in 1938, with the sale of most of the contents the year before. Thornbridge in Derbyshire, Henry Charles Boot's home since 1929, was one estate to benefit from much of the statuary and facades from Clumber, along with Newstead Abbey, home to Lord Byron, whose Clumber Lodge is built entirely from materials from Clumber House.

In 1939, the War Department requisitioned Clumber Park and the 9th Duke handed over the estate. During the Second World War, the park was used by the army for ammunition storage and military training. The Lincoln Stables were used as a decontamination centre, the cricket pavilion as a medical hut and the Duke's garage was used for entertainment and meetings.

Lime Tree Avenue was lined with hundreds of corrugated iron ammunition stores, each containing up to 400 cubic feet of shells including naval shells that stood over 3 feet high. In addition to these stores, there were also Nissen huts built all over the park, including along

Lime Tree Avenue. These were used to accommodate army personnel. After the war, clearing the park of ammunition took many years and it was 1955 before the military eventually left.

In 1946, the National Trust purchased Clumber Park with the aid of donations and opened it to the public in the late 1950s.

MTBO in Great Britain.

The world Mountain Bike Orienteering (MTBO) champs are scheduled to be held in Scotland in 2026. British Mountain Bike Orienteering (BMBO) are contacting all British Orienteering clubs with the hope of identifying a small team of individuals who would be sufficiently motivated to contribute one or more MTBO events in 2025/26. Will you join the pathway to the world MTBO 2026?

The world MTBO championships will be held in the Moray area of Scotland 3-7 June 2026. We would like to see a large number of British riders taking part in 2025 and 2026. However there is a need more events across the country, for riders to take part and practise their skills. We would like to boost the opportunities to take part. So BMBO are asking if you can get involved.



Riders can take part in any MTBO in age categories, there is a category for eMTB riders as well. To this end we are seeking to raise the profile of MTBO in 2025 and first half of 2026, to give riders ample opportunity to take part, get the bug, practise rides and then compete the 2026 World Championships. For 2025 we have already 2 weekend events planned, one on the south coast of England date TBC and one Moray near Inverness date TBC. We are hoping to add a lot more events to the 2025 and 2026 calendars.

Clubs can:

- Stage 1 is to express your interest in being involved
- Stage 2 is to identify an individuals who will have enthusiasm to make an event happen.
- Stage 3 to identify a suitable event are and seek permissions
- Stage 4 to add your event to MTBO calendar Stage 4 to plan the event
- Stage 5 to run the events on the day. And share the results.

MTBO races come in three categories: Sprint a win time of about 20 -25 minutes; Middle with win time of about 50-55 minutes (6-7 km) (15-17km); Long with a win time of about 105 - 115 minutes. (c30km). These events take place in areas with:

- · orienteering maps
- tracks that are cycle-able

· a suitable complex track network

MTBO is about about quick execution of route choice while riding as fast as possible. MTBO is not about stopping to read micro detail to find either the control or indistinct track junctions

Junior Regional Orienteering Squads (JROS) Summer Camps Availability Request (2025)

Introduction

The Junior Regional Orienteering Squads (JROS) was set up to further develop the junior orienteering talent which is nurtured by the 12 Regional Squads. As such JROS has, for over 10 years organised and managed a number of training camps for junior orienteers.



These camps vary in length and in the age of the orienteers attending them, but they all share the same objective, that is to develop the orienteering talents of youngsters by giving them the opportunity to train over a period with likeminded individuals, in a variety of terrains and under the supervision of experienced coaches.

However, these opportunities cannot go ahead without the support of volunteers who provide a range of skills including Team Management, Chefs, Coaching Managers, Senior and Assistant Coaches and in-Forest Teams.

Here are comments from previous junior coaches who attended the Lagganlia Camp;

"I really enjoyed coaching on Lagganlia. Previously the only coaching I had done was with very inexperienced juniors in my school and club so getting the chance to coach juniors at a TD5 level was much more interesting."

"Dealing with real athletes in real situations helps to develop skills and experience much faster than in an artificial classroom situation and the intense (regular 14 hour days) nature of the camp only enhanced this."

Outline of the Camps

Lagganlia (Saturday 19th July 2025 - Saturday July 2025)

Based at the Lagganlia OEC near to Aviemore in Scotland this camp caters for approximately 24 M/W14's. Staffing is usually around 14 coaches and a forest team supported by two chefs (lead and assistant), all managed by the Team Manager. The camp lasts for 6 days training, Sunday to Friday with assembly on Saturday. We would be pleased if someone wishes to undertake an Assistant camp manager position

Much of the coaching is aimed at teaching the basic technical skills within a wide variety of situations and venues.

This is an ideal camp for those who have never attended a camp as a coach and is an excellent opportunity for Level 1 and 2 coaches who may be looking to widen their coaching experience before moving on to the next level of coaching. As the coach: athlete ratio is high, this gives lots of opportunity for the inexperienced coach to learn supported by more experienced individuals.

Being a member of the forest team at Lagganlia also provides the opportunity for experienced orienteers without formal qualifications to get involved with coaching at this level. Duties would include putting out and collecting controls, assisting senior coaches, attending briefing sessions.

Deeside at Findhorn (Sunday 20 July 2025 - Saturday 26 July 2025)

This camp caters for approximately 20 M/W15's, many of whom will have previously attended a Lagganlia camp.

Staffing will be of the order of 9-10 coaches and forest team with similar numbers of support staff as Lagganlia. The camp requires a Lead Coach, Assistant Camp Manager and Chefs.

Coaching on this camp seeks to take the athletes to the next level of speed and complexity and expects them to be more confident and proficient in the terrain.

Czech (Saturday 16th August 2025 - Monday 25th August 2025)

This is a camp which is for M/W16's initiated to ensure enough camps are still available to juniors and give a taste of continental terrain. The camp is in the Jizera mountains near Liberec in the north of the Czech Republic.

Staffing will be of the order of 8 coaches and cater for up to 20 athletes.

Stockholm (Tuesday 19th August - Sunday 31st August 2025)

This camp is based at the club hut of OK Ravinen in the environs of Stockholm. There is the opportunity to leave early to participate in British Sprint and Sprint Relay Championships. There are likely to be about 16 mainly M/W17's.

In order to keep costs down the athletes are expected to organise their own assembly and to meet up at the hut. Public transport is used extensively on this camp and athletes are expected to be mature and reasonably self-sufficient.

Athletes will also compete in local competition throughout the camp.

The number of staff will be of the order of 6 including a Chef and Team Manager.

All members of the camp will join OK Ravinen, thus allowing them free use of the club hut, and also entry to SOFT events.

Gothenburg (Friday 22nd August - Monday 1st September 2025)

The camp will be based in the Savedalens AIK club hut on the outskirts of Gothenburg, this is an ideal centre with plenty of forest right on the door step plus a nice lake for swimming etc. The camp is aimed at providing a group of M/W18's and 19's a taste of planning and organising their own training in Scandinavian terrain, as well as supporting themselves by preparing their own meals and organising transportation. The camp will be for the order of 18 athletes. There is the opportunity to leave early to participate in British Sprint and Sprint Relay Championships.

It is likely that there will only be two senior coaches present to help and guide the athletes and therefore some experience of training in Scandinavia is essential.

Hawkshead (Friday 28 November - Sun 30 November 2025)

The camp at YHA Hawkshead for M/W16s may require Forest Team assistants to hang and collect controls. Details of numbers will be available closer to the time, but you can indicate now if you would be willing to help. A further request will be issued closer to the camp.

Requirements

Team Manager

Responsible for all aspects of the camp - outside the forest. Accommodation, transport during the camp (but not necessarily to/from the venue) and the general well being of juniors whilst on the camp. Additionally may have responsibility for ordering camp specific clothing and liaising with the chefs to ensure appropriate and adequate nutrition is provided.

They will also be responsible for budgetary control of the camp.

Lead Coach

Responsible for all aspects of the 'forest' activities of the group and work with the Team Manager to plan all activities for the week.

Will manage the coaching team, delegating aspects of the training to appropriate coaches. Will be responsible for the health and safety of all athletes within the forest environment.

Is also responsible for producing timely reports on all juniors attending the camp and distributing them to the respective Regional Coordinators.

Chef

Responsible to the Team Manager for the preparation of all meals for the camp party members, being cognisant of any special dietary requirements or allergies of attendees.

Responsible for the buying of all required foodstuffs for the period of the camp.

Senior Coaches

Responsible to the Lead Coach for aspects of the coaching programme as decided by the Lead Coach. Responsible for delivering planned coaching activities to a group of athletes and collection of feedback to inform individual athlete camp reports.

Assistant Coach

Responsible to a senior coach in the delivery of planned coaching activities to individual athletes and collection of feedback to inform individual athlete camp reports.
